The mission includes energizing and motivating the intellectual community to generate ideas through research to help shape policy and specific action. We are interested in the production and dissemination of policy-relevant ideas through the Journal of Bangladesh Studies (JBS), books, conferences and other publications incorporating expert opinion and relevant research. 

Overview of the Subir & Malini Chowdhuri Center for Bangladesh Studies



The Subir & Malini Chowdhury Center for Bangladesh Studies was established in December 2013. It was officially inaugurated on March 30, 2015, with a generous gift from the Subir and Malini Chowdhury Foundation, by UC Berkeley Chancellor Nicholas Dirks, Founder & Chairman of BRAC Sir Fazle Hasan Abed, and Mr. Subir Chowdhury.

The Center is housed under the Institute for South Asia Studies at the University of California, Berkeley, and it champions the study of Bangladesh's cultures, peoples and history. The first of its kind in the US, the Center's mission is to create an innovative model combining research, scholarships, the promotion of art and culture, and the building of ties between institutions in Bangladesh and the University.

The pioneering force behind the Center is Subir Chowdhury. Mr. Chowdhury, originally from Chittagong and trained as an engineer, is a renowned business consultant, author of many books, and is one of the world's leading management gurus particularly known for his emphasis on quality.

In addition to promoting and integrating interdisciplinary scholarship, the Subir and Malini Chowdhury Center will sponsor lectures and conferences and provide the following three scholarships:

- The Subir Chowdhury Fellowship on Quality of Life in Bangladesh is for graduate students and will be matched by the University's Graduate Fellowship Matching Program.
- The Malini Chowdhury Fellowship on Bangladesh Studies is for graduate students in any field concentrating on Bangladesh studies and will also be matched by the University's Graduate Fellowship Matching Program.
- The Subir Chowdhury Undergraduate Scholarship will be awarded to students concentrating in South and Southeast Asian Studies at Berkeley and will be matched by the Ford Challenge, a fund provided by a Berkeley donor to match undergraduate scholarship gifts.

Recent BDI Lifetime Achievement Awardees

Dr. Hameeda Hossain – 2021

Dr. Hameeda Hossain has dedicated her life to advocating for the poor and marginalized in Bangladesh. Born in Hyderabad, Sindh, in 1936, she attended missionary schools in Karachi and Hyderabad. Her early activism began when, at the age of 15, she won an essay competition sponsored by the *New York Herald Tribune* on "The World We Want," which took her on a three-month tour of the U.S. She studied literature and history at Wellesley College, USA, and earned her doctorate in history from Oxford University, UK. Her thesis, later published as *Company Weavers of Bengal*, examines textile production for the East India Company.

Throughout her career, Dr. Hossain has made significant contributions to publishing, women's rights, and human rights. She co-founded the *Forum* magazine in East Pakistan in 1967, serving as its editor and highlighting political and social inequities. After Bangladesh's independence, she joined University Press Limited and became involved in rehabilitating women survivors of wartime sexual violence, establishing KARIKA, a cooperative for artisans. Her advocacy work also influenced her doctoral research on weavers in colonial Bengal.

Dr. Hossain has published extensively on women's experiences during Bangladesh's Liberation War, artisanal crafts, and labor rights. Notable works include *No Better Option? Industrial Women Workers in Bangladesh* and *Of the Nation Born: The Bangladesh Papers*. A staunch advocate for workers' rights, she founded *Ain o Salish Kendra* and currently leads the *Sramik Nirapotta Forum*.

An international women's rights activist, she has participated in numerous global events and contributed to Bangladesh's reports for CEDAW. Her unwavering commitment to civil liberties, economic justice, and secularism has left an indelible mark on Bangladesh's feminist movement, and she continues to work toward a more just and equitable society. For her work and dedication to uplifting the status of women in Bangladesh, Dr. Hossain was honored with the *2021 BDI Lifetime Achievement Award*.

Dr. Samir Saha (PhD, FAAM, FRCPath) – 2023

Professor Samir K. Saha is the Founder and Executive Director of the Child Health Research Foundation (CHRF) and serves as the Head of Microbiology at the *Bangladesh Shishu Hospital and Institute* in Dhaka. A globally recognized expert in pediatric infectious diseases, his research focuses on pneumonia, meningitis, and enteric fever in Bangladesh. His work has been instrumental in understanding the burden of these diseases, their causative agents, drug resistance patterns, and serotype distribution, leading to the introduction of Hib and pneumococcal vaccines in the country.

In 2017, Prof. Saha became the first scientist from a developing country to receive the American Society for Microbiology (ASM) award for his outstanding research in clinical microbiology. That same year, he was inducted as a fellow into the *American Academy of Microbiology* and awarded the *UNESCO Carlos J. Finlay Prize for Microbiology*. In 2019, his publication in *The Lancet* earned the *Charles C. Shepard Science Award* for public health contributions. Prof. Saha also received the FRCPath distinction from the Royal College of Pathologists, UK, later that year.

In 2020, Prof. Saha and his daughter, Dr. Senjuti Saha, were recognized by Bill Gates as "Heroes in the Field" for their work on reducing child mortality and advancing global health equity. Under his leadership, Bangladesh's first SARS-CoV-2 genome was sequenced. In 2021, Prof. Saha received the prestigious *Ekushey Padak*, Bangladesh's second-highest civilian award, for his lifelong contributions to science and public health.

Prof. Saha is a member of the *National Immunization Technical Advisory Group* (NiTAG) in Bangladesh and a board member of the *International Society of Pneumonia and Pneumococcal Diseases* (ISPPD). He has authored over 200 peer-reviewed papers and leads several multi-country research initiatives. For his lifelong work in the scientific arena and his leadership in improving the health of ordinary people, especially children, Dr. Saha was honored with the *2023 BDI Lifetime Achievement Award*.

Keynote Speakers

Dr. Ahmed Mushtaque Raza Chowdhury is the former Vice Chair of BRAC, one of the world's largest NGOs. He has the unique distinction of serving on the leadership team of BRAC as a close associate of Sir Fazle Abed for nearly 30 years. He has served BRAC as its Executive Director, founding Director of the Research and Evaluation Division, and founding Dean of the James P. Grant School of Public Health at BRAC University. Presently, he is a professor at Columbia University's Mailman School of Public Health. From 2009 to 2012, he was a senior adviser to the Rockefeller Foundation in Thailand. Dr. Chowdhury is involved with several organizations, including the South Asia Centre at the London School of Economics and the Asia-Pacific Action Alliance on Human Resources for Health. He coordinated the UN Millennium Task Force on Child Health and Maternal Health. His accolades include the Innovator of the Year 2006 award from Brigham Young University, the PESON oration medal from the Perinatal Society of Nepal, and the Outstanding Leadership Award from Dhaka University. Dr. Chowdhury holds a PhD from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, an MSc from the London School of Economics, and a BA (Statistics) from the University of Dhaka. His interests span education, public health, and poverty eradication. He has authored a number of books, and recently served as a Visiting Scholar at the University of Notre Dame's Pulte Institute and Eck Institute for Global Health in 2023-24.

Tarfia Faizullah is the acclaimed author of two poetry collections, "Registers of Illuminated Villages" (2018) and "Seam" (2014). Her work is widely published in notable outlets such as Poetry Magazine, the Huffington Post, and the New Republic, and has been featured in exhibitions at the Smithsonian and the Rubin Museum of Art. Tarfia has received numerous accolades, including a Fulbright fellowship and three Pushcart prizes. She has presented her work globally at prestigious venues like the Library of Congress, the Fulbright Conference, and the Poetry Foundation. Her poetry has been translated into multiple languages, including Bengali and Persian, and is part of the theater production "Birangona: Women of War." Tarfia's interdisciplinary collaborations span various art forms, resulting in projects like the EP "Eat More Mango." Recognized by Harvard Law School as one of 50 Women Inspiring Change in 2016, she is also a 2019 USA Artists Fellow. Born in Brooklyn to Bangladeshi immigrants and raised in Texas, Tarfia currently resides in Dallas.

Dr. Nazrul Islam served as the Chief of Development Research at the United Nations. He has led the preparation of key UN reports on global development and provides policy advice to senior management. Dr. Islam holds a PhD in economics from Harvard University and an MSc from Moscow State University. He has taught at several prestigious institutions, including Dhaka University, Harvard, Emory, Kyushu, and St. John's University, and joined the UN in 2006. He is widely known for his contributions to growth, transition, sustainable development, and political economy relating to Bangladesh. He has published twenty books and numerous articles in international journals. He founded the Bangladesh Environment Network (BEN) in 1998 and initiated the formation of Bangladesh Poribesh Andolon (BAPA) in 2000.

Dr. Fahmida Khatun serves as the Executive Director of the Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD), a prominent think tank in Bangladesh and South Asia, established by Professor Rehman Sobhan. She is also a Non-resident Senior Fellow at the Atlantic Council, USA, and a member of the High-level Advisory Board on the Productive Capacities Index (PCI) of UNCTAD. Dr. Khatun serves on the Task Force on Climate, Development, and the IMF, and is a member of the Governing Body of BRAC, the world's largest NGO. She co-chaired the T20 India Task Force on "Accelerating SDGs" for the G20 in 2023 and is currently part of the Interim Government of Bangladesh's Task Force on

economic strategy. She has been recently appointed as a Director on the Board of Bangladesh Bank. Dr. Khatun holds a Masters and PhD in Economics from University College London (UCL), and completed post-doctoral research at Columbia University as a Fulbright Scholar, collaborating with Professor Jeffrey Sachs.

Dr. Birupaksha Paul has been teaching economics and conducting research at the State University of New York (SUNY) at Cortland since 2007. He served as the chief economist of Bangladesh Bank in 2015–2016, and has been a guest speaker at Dhaka University and various forums in Bangladesh. Dr. Paul holds a BSS (Honors) and MSS in economics from Dhaka University, an MBA in finance from the University of Technology-Sydney, and a PhD in economics from Binghamton University. His research has been widely published in international journals. He received the Outstanding Achievement in Research Award from SUNY Cortland in 2015. Dr. Paul has authored several books in Bengali on topics such as the banking, free market economics, and South Asian economies. His notable works include, *Essays on Indian Business Cycles and Inflation* (2007), and *Empowering Economic Growth for Bangladesh: Investment Strategies, Macro Policies, and Institutions* (2019). He regularly writes columns for the leading newspapers in Bangladesh on banking reform and macroeconomic policies.

Dr. Selim Raihan is a Professor of Economics at the University of Dhaka and the Executive Director of the South Asian Network on Economic Modeling (SANEM). He holds a PhD from the University of Manchester, UK, where he is also an Honorary Senior Research Fellow. He serves on the Board of Directors of the Global Development Network (GDN). Professor Raihan is an expert in international trade, economic growth, poverty, labor markets, macroeconomic policies, political economy, and climate change. He has published extensively in journals, books, and working papers. He edits "Thinking Aloud," a monthly digest from SANEM, and writes columns for leading newspapers in Bangladesh. He has collaborated with organizations like the Asian Development Bank, World Bank, UNDP, and the Commonwealth Secretariat. His most recent contribution is the book, "Is the Bangladesh Paradox Sustainable? The Institutional Diagnostic Project," co-edited with François Bourguignon, and Umar Salam, published by The Cambridge University Press.

Dr. Farhana Sultana is a Professor in the Department of Geography and the Environment at Syracuse University's Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs, where she also serves as the Research Director for Environmental Collaboration and Conflicts at PARCC. An internationally acclaimed scholar, Dr. Sultana's interdisciplinary work encompasses political ecology, water governance, climate change, post-colonial development, social and environmental justice, decolonizing knowledge, and transnational feminisms. Her extensive research and activism are informed by her diverse experiences across three continents and her robust academic background in natural and social sciences, as well as policy. Before Syracuse, she taught at King's College London and worked with the UNDP. Dr. Sultana has authored numerous publications, including notable books like "The Right to Water" (2012) and "Water Politics" (2020) and "Confronting Climate Coloniality: Decolonizing Pathways for Climate Justice" (2024). She holds an A.B. (Cum Laude) from Princeton University and a PhD from the University of Minnesota, where she was a MacArthur Fellow. In 2019, she received the Glenda Laws Award from the American Association of Geographers for her outstanding contributions to geographic research on social issues.
